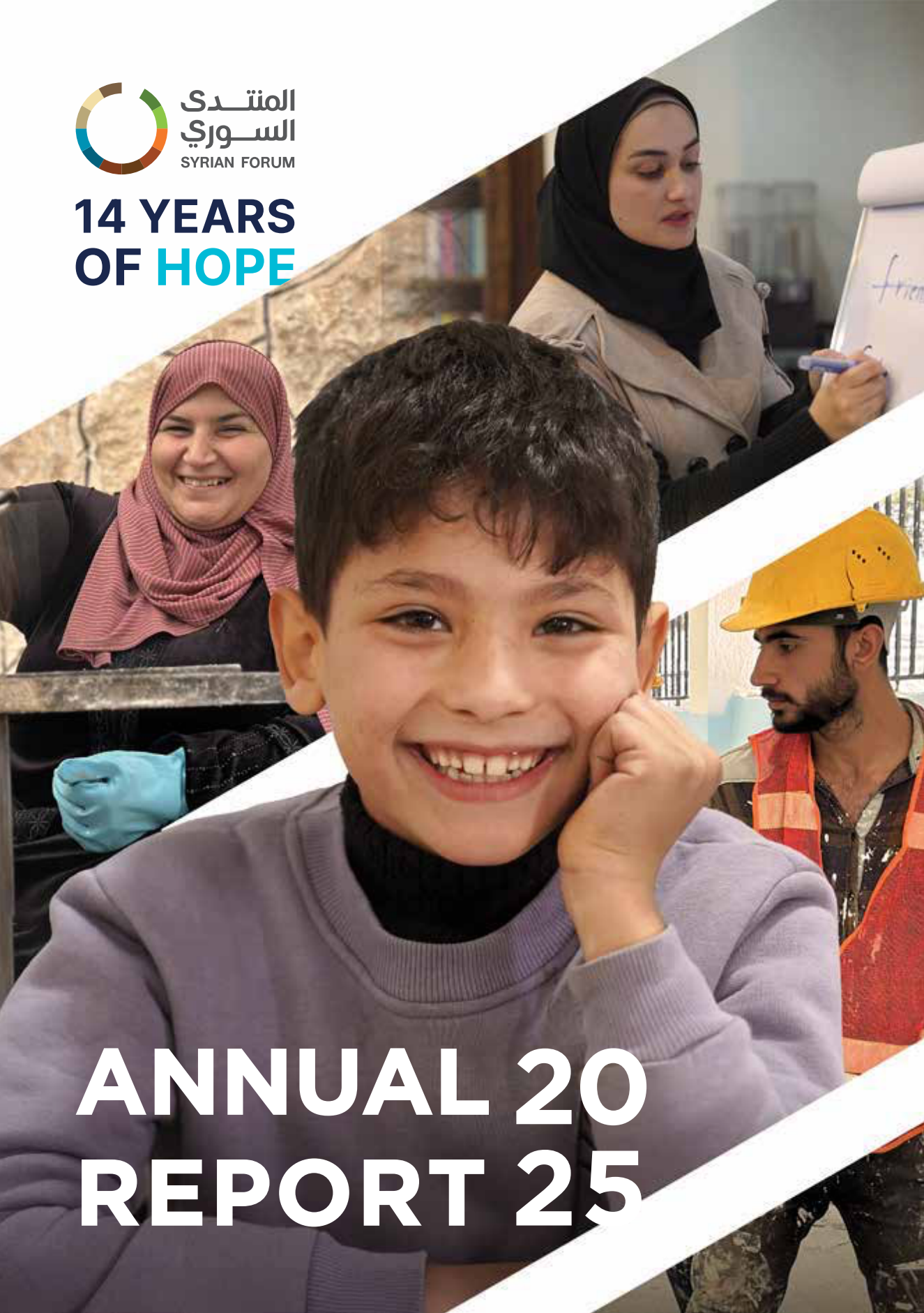

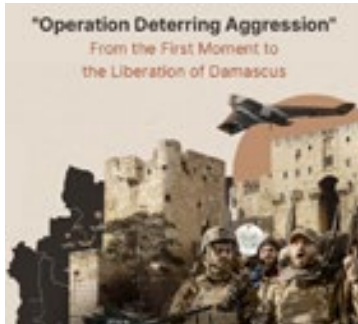

To empower Syrian communities by advancing economic and educational development and strengthening the principles of accountability, contributing to the building of a democratic, prosperous, and just society.

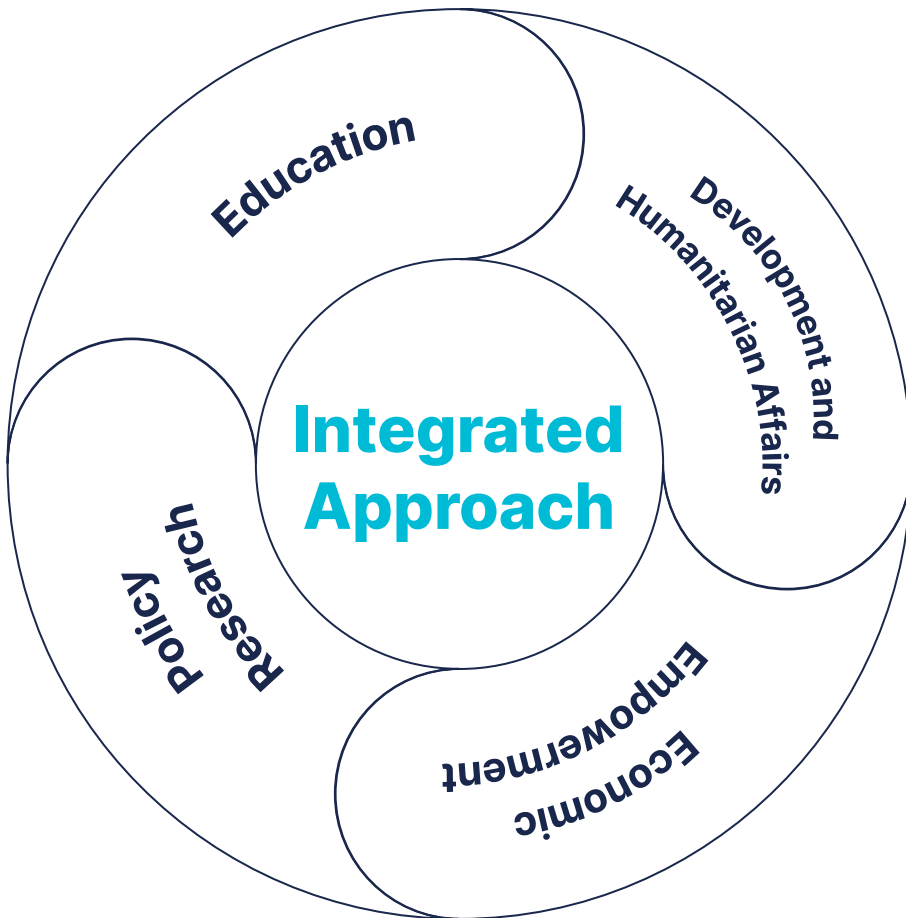

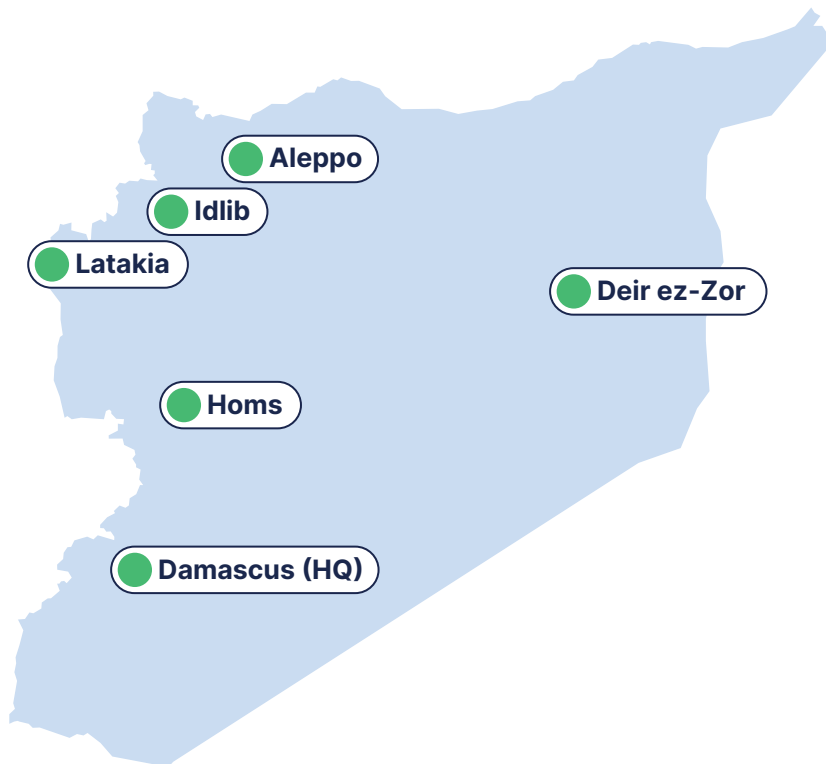

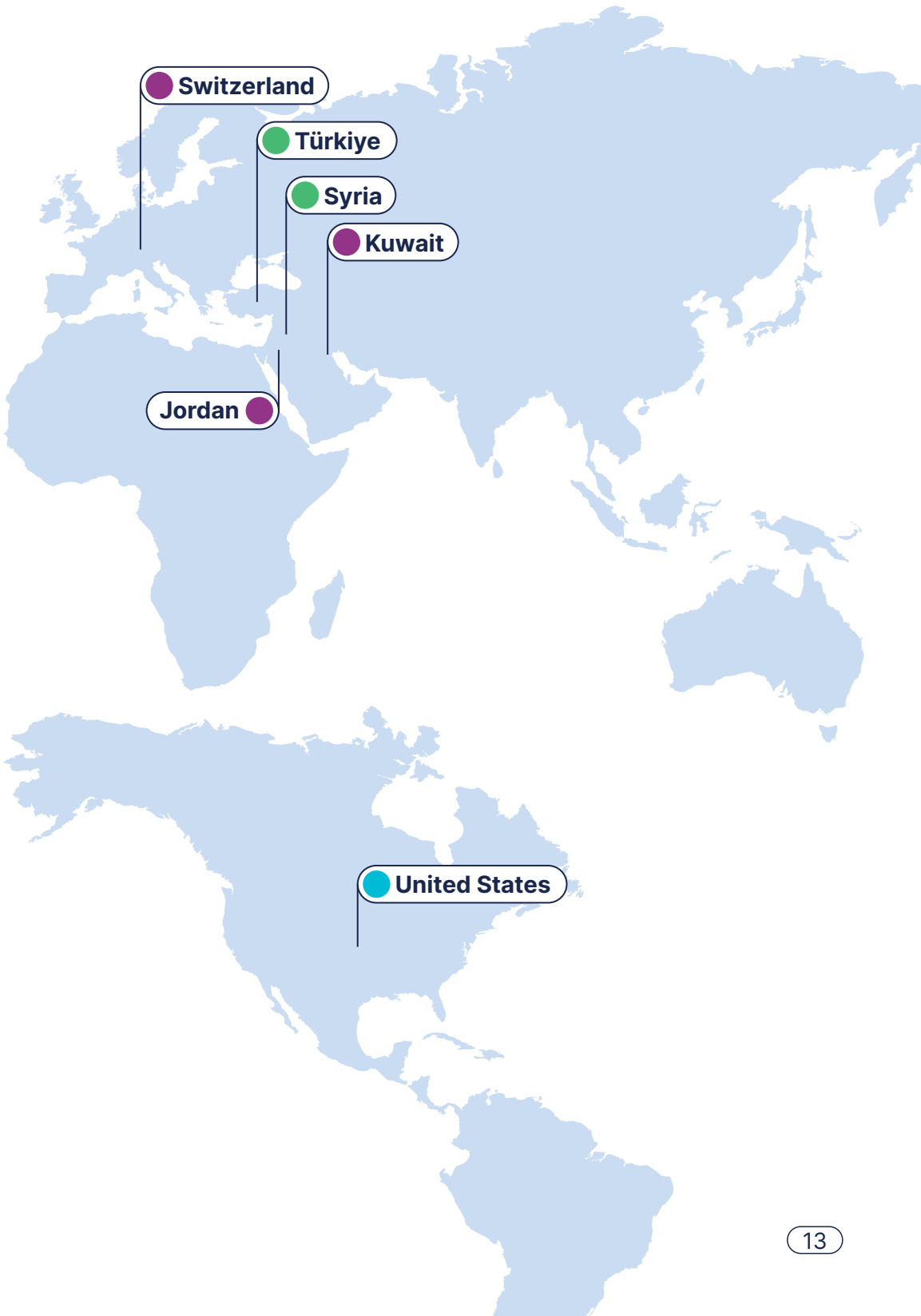

Established in **2015**, it operates through its offices in Chicago and Washington, D.C.

Syrian Forum USA works in partnership with the Syrian Forum to support programs related to development and humanitarian affairs, economic empowerment, research and public policy, and advocacy to shed light on the humanitarian situation and the Syrian crisis.



STRATEGIC OUTREACH AND ENGAGEMENT IN 2025:

- During Ramadan **2025**, over **80** fundraising and outreach events were held across more than **20** states through masjids, universities, and community centers.

These engagements combined fundraising appeals, donor interaction, awareness-building, and community outreach, significantly expanding visibility and supporter engagement during one of the most impactful giving seasons of the year.

- More than **100** Friday khutbas and masjid fundraising appeals were conducted across key U.S. states, including Texas, California, Illinois, New Jersey, New York, and Florida. These events aimed to strengthen awareness of the humanitarian situation in Syria, expand donor outreach, and contribute to sustained community support and recurring giving.
- More than **25** fundraising and donor appreciation events were held, helping secure crucial resources while deepening relationships with our supporters and celebrating their generosity and commitment.



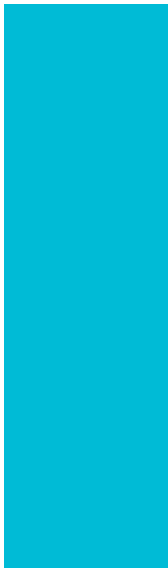
- Over **10** educational and awareness sessions were delivered through universities, community forums, and policy discussions, including engagements at institutions such as Harvard and UCSD, as well as forums in Washington, D.C. Sessions focused on humanitarian conditions in Syria, policy developments, and mobilizing community awareness and engagement.
- Participation in more than **40** conferences and conventions strengthened national visibility and community engagement. Major events included ICNA, ISNA, MAS, MUNA, AMJA, AMP, and SAMS conferences across multiple cities. Activities included sponsorship visibility, speaker participation, leadership engagement, information booths, and direct donor interaction, enabling meaningful connections with thousands of attendees.

- Syrian Forum USA received the Vetted Organization recognition from GlobalGiving in **2025**, acknowledging strong standards of transparency, accountability, and organizational effectiveness, while reinforcing trust with donors and partners.

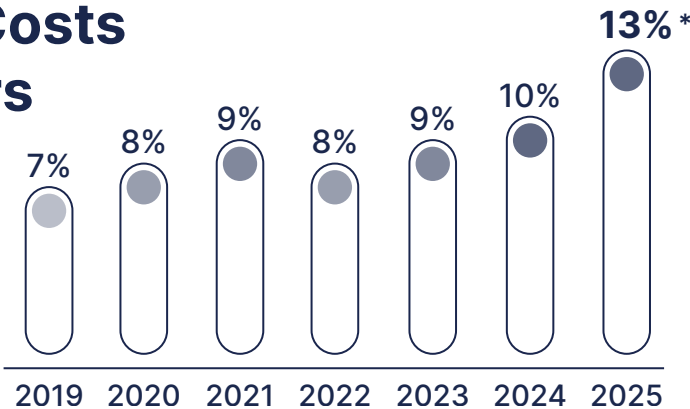

Why Did Administrative Costs Increase in 2025?

In **2025**, administrative costs increased to **13%**, compared to **10% in 2024**.

While this represents a temporary increase of approximately **3 percentage points**, it reflects a year of significant operational transition from Türkiye to Syria and changes in external funding rather than a structural increase in overhead.

Several key factors contributed to this change:

-  **1. Reduction in International Funding**
International funding, including support from USAID and other international NGOs, declined by approximately **33%** compared to **2024**. While Syrian Forum proactively reduced operational expenses by **25%**, the decrease in total program funding affected the ratio of administrative costs to overall expenses.
-  **2. Operational Transition from Türkiye to Syria**
As operations transitioned into Syria after liberation, the organization incurred one-time setup and transition costs. These included office establishment and rental expenses, registration and legal setup fees, operational infrastructure costs, and severance obligations associated with staff transition.
-  **3. Increased Outreach and Fundraising Efforts**
Changes in donor giving patterns in the United States required additional investment in donor outreach, communications, and fundraising efforts to sustain humanitarian programs and diversify funding sources.

Despite this temporary increase, **Syrian Forum** remains committed to operational efficiency and financial accountability. Our goal for **2026** is to reduce administrative costs to levels comparable to those of previous years, **2024** and earlier, while continuing to strengthen program quality, humanitarian reach, and long-term organizational sustainability.

DEVELOPMENT & HUMANITARIAN AFFAIRS

Our program is designed to deliver critical services that address the urgent needs of Syrians, while laying the groundwork for long-term stability and growth.

Through targeted efforts across key sectors, we empower Syrians to achieve self-reliance and build sustainable livelihoods, helping shape a future rooted in dignity, opportunity, and resilience.

How We Work

Needs-Based

Our approach to programs is based on understanding and identifying the needs of local communities through various assessment tools, including interviews, focus group discussions, and surveys.

Monitoring, Evaluation, Accountability, and Learning

Through this function, we can monitor the outputs of programs and measure their impact through baseline and end-line assessments.

It also provides access to beneficiaries with channels to submit feedback and complaints. Our MEAL department allows us to learn lessons from previous projects and apply them moving forward to strengthen our future programming.

Strong Program Design

The Programs Department works to identify gaps and create a program aimed at addressing the root causes of needs.

Communities and local councils are consulted at this stage to better understand the feasibility of such programs and to ensure community participation.

Continuous Institutional Development and Capacity Building

Reviewing all the operations of the organization's departments and ensuring that the policies and procedures adopted are followed, in addition to developing suggestions and recommendations that enhance the internal control process and raise the level of professionalism and transparency within the organization.

We also make great efforts to build the capacities of the team, especially those working on the front lines.

- Distributed over **330K m³** of drinking water to people in the camps.
- Distributed more than **260K** bars of soap and over **41K** hygiene kits.

- Rehabilitated a water well in Al-Shajara, Daraa, and connected it to the water network.
- Conducted more than **1,900** hygiene awareness sessions in schools and camps.
- Installed **4** solar energy systems to promote clean, alternative energy, and sustain service delivery.
- Distributed over **1,250** garbage containers, collected over **4,200 m³** of solid waste to landfills, and established **1** wastewater treatment plant.
- Provided operational support for **23** water stations, including electricity (**4M kWh**), fuel (**254K liters**), and chlorine (**3.8M tablets**), in addition to maintenance services, as well as training station workers and covering their wages.

Our education projects are designed to address the multifaceted challenges faced by children and teachers in Syria.

Through our comprehensive efforts in school rehabilitation, distribution of educational materials, and targeted support for teachers, we seek to dismantle the barriers to education, fostering an environment where learning can flourish against all odds, because we believe that education is the most powerful tool for empowerment and change.

- Carried out **84** Back-to-School campaigns and education awareness initiatives to boost school attendance.

Our Education Model

Education is more than rebuilding classrooms; it is rebuilding futures, restoring dignity, and giving an entire generation the foundation they need to lead Syria forward.

Our Education Model is built on a simple but powerful belief: a child cannot reach their full potential without the right environment at school and at home. That is why our approach goes beyond curricula and technology; it places equal focus on the student, the family, and the teacher, creating a comprehensive ecosystem where every child is seen, supported, and given the chance to thrive.

Building Educators Who Build Futures

A school is only as strong as its teachers. That is why our Teachers' Academy continues to invest deeply in the professionals who shape our students every single day.

By bridging school and home life, engaging families in the educational process, and equipping teachers with the tools to lead, our Education Model creates ripples that extend far beyond the classroom.

Orphans and vulnerable children who once had no clear path forward are now sitting in classrooms, raising their hands, and imagining futures that felt impossible just years ago. Families are more engaged. Teachers are more empowered. Communities are more hopeful.

In **2025**, our capacity-building program equipped educators with the tools, skills, and confidence to transform their classrooms:

- Prevention of Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA)
- Risks of War Remnants and How to Handle Them
- Classroom Management and Teaching Methods
- Integrating Technology into Educational Activities
- Positive Discipline
- Staff Self-Care
- Peer Coaching





ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT

Our Economic Empowerment Program enables Syrians to move from skills development to sustainable economic opportunities by connecting training with real market demand.

Through technical and vocational bootcamps, entrepreneurship development, small business grants, and employment services, we equip participants with the skills needed to access jobs and start businesses. Our goal is to promote self-reliance and contribute to Syria's long-term recovery and resilience.

Small Business Grants

Our program turns entrepreneurial potential into viable economic opportunities by supporting Syrians who are ready to start or strengthen their own businesses, with particular attention to women-led households and persons with disabilities.

Before receiving funding, participants go through a structured entrepreneurship journey that includes business planning, budgeting, market analysis, pricing, financial forecasting, and practical business management.

By grant reception day, they don't just have funding; they have a plan. As these entrepreneurs become active in their communities, they generate income, respond to local market needs, create opportunities for others, and strengthen local economic activity.

Value per Grant

The grants supported projects such as:

- Poultry shop.
- Sewing workshop.
- Women's beauty salon.
- Food processing centers.
- Household goods and tools.
- Dairy and cheese production.
- Beekeeping and honey production.





Dollani Initiative

This initiative is part of the Syrian Forum's broader effort to economically empower youth in Syria through the rapidly growing field of digital technology.

It's designed to equip young people with in-demand digital skills, ranging from coding and design to e-commerce and digital marketing, while also building entrepreneurial capacity through business planning and financial literacy.

This dual focus enables youth not only to access remote work opportunities but to launch and manage their own digital ventures, turning freelance skills into small businesses.

Dollani not only enhances individual livelihoods but also contributes to the economic resilience of entire communities.

By tapping into the global digital economy, these youth are transforming their futures, turning skills into stability, and potential into progress.

Hands for the Future

A **12**-month project aimed at developing a skilled workforce in Aleppo, Homs, and Damascus that aligns with the demands of the industrial labor market, while enhancing employment opportunities and promoting self-reliance among youth.

The project agreement was signed in **2025**, during which planning, coordination, and preparatory activities were carried out. Implementation is scheduled to commence in **2026**, with training programs and field activities benefiting more than **600** youth.



She Leads

Designed to identify and accelerate the leadership potential of Syrian women, She Leads combines assessment, leadership development, practical challenges, mentoring, and access to professional networks.

The program equips emerging women leaders with the capabilities and experience needed to demonstrate leadership readiness, strengthen their influence, and progress toward positions of greater responsibility and decision-making across different sectors in Syria.

Omran is an independent research institution that plays a leading role in advancing knowledge and research on Syria, its state, society, and regional context.

Our Impact

Reevaluating Sanctions on Syria: Balancing Accountability, Recovery, and Democratic Transition

January

A seminar convened in Damascus in January **2025** brought together leading experts in sanctions policy, reconstruction, transitional governance, and justice—including Yaser Tabbara, Dr. Karam Shaar, Dr. Jamal Mansour, and Zahra Al-Barazi—to assess the evolving sanctions landscape and its implications for Syria's economic and institutional recovery.

Discussions centered on the need to maintain targeted measures against individuals and entities linked to the former regime while easing specific sectoral restrictions to enable reconstruction and economic revitalization.

The seminar concluded with a set of policy recommendations aimed at strengthening societal resilience, mitigating unintended humanitarian impacts, and supporting a sustainable, accountable post-conflict transition for Syria.



Captagon Trade

February & August

In partnership with the New Lines Institute and MedGlobal, the Syrian Forum organized two high-level Captagon Trade Conferences bringing together policymakers, researchers, regional stakeholders, and security experts to examine the evolving dynamics of the Captagon economy and its broader implications for Syria and the region.

Each conference engaged approximately **30** participants, creating a focused platform for dialogue on regional cooperation, accountability measures, and sustainable approaches to addressing narcotics-related challenges.

The discussions explored key issues related to the evolution of the Captagon trade, regional security implications, public health considerations, and the need for economic alternatives and stabilization strategies in post-conflict contexts.

The Damascus edition represented a significant milestone in regional dialogue on narcotics policy and post-conflict governance, reinforcing the Syrian Forum's role as a convening platform for evidence-based policy discussions and cross-sector engagement.





Interactive Methods for Teaching Law Through Practice

May

In collaboration with the Faculty of Law at Damascus University, we organized a two-day training workshop led by Dr. Ahmad Khalifeh, where he introduced innovative, practice-oriented approaches to legal education aimed at bridging the gap between academic instruction and real-world application.

The participating students engaged in applied learning exercises, including simulated court models and problem-solving scenarios, designed to strengthen critical thinking, legal reasoning, and professional skills, fostering a more dynamic and experiential legal learning environment and enhancing the readiness of academic staff to adopt modern, interactive teaching methodologies aligned with international best practices.

Chemical Weapons Accountability

September

As part of its continued commitment to justice and accountability in Syria, the Syrian Forum joined the organizing committee of the International Chemical Weapons Conference held in Damascus in September **2025**.

The conference brought together more than **150** participants, including victims and survivors, civil society organizations, international organizations, researchers, and policymakers, to discuss pathways toward accountability for the use of chemical weapons in Syria.

The Syrian Forum contributed to panel discussions and collaborative dialogue focused on strengthening international accountability mechanisms, supporting victims and survivors, and advancing guarantees of non-repetition. The conference concluded with a joint set of recommendations emphasizing the importance of international cooperation, justice-centered approaches, and sustained efforts to address chemical weapons violations in Syria.



Advocacy Tours

Geneva March

In partnership with Legal Action Worldwide (LAW) and with sponsorship from the Permanent Mission of the Syrian Arab Republic to the United Nations Office and other International Organizations in Geneva, the Syrian Forum convened a landmark side event during the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights' session titled **"Towards a Holistic Accountability Framework for Syria."**

Bringing together representatives from the Syrian government, civil society, and international justice institutions from more than **30** countries, the event marked the first public dialogue of its kind on justice and accountability for Syria.

Panelists examined the fragmentation of existing accountability efforts, the role of international mechanisms, including the Commission of Inquiry (COI), the International Criminal Court (ICC), the International Court of Justice (ICJ), the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons (OPCW), and the Independent Institution on Missing Persons in the Syrian Arab Republic (IIMP), and the prospects for a Syrian-led transitional justice process supported by global institutions, highlighting the growing international momentum for a coordinated, inclusive, and forward-looking justice framework for Syria.

Washington, D.C. April & October

The Syrian Forum strengthened its policy engagement in Washington, D.C., contributing to critical discussions on sanctions reform, reconstruction, transitional justice, and Syria's economic recovery.

Through sustained engagements with Congressional offices, U.S. Department of State officials, Treasury Department representatives, the World Bank Group, and International Financial Institutions, civil society coalitions, and policy organizations, we helped elevate dialogue on pathways toward stability, institutional reform, and sustainable recovery in Syria.

Participation in the Seventh Annual Gulf International Conference in Washington, D.C. further expanded opportunities to engage policymakers, economic experts, regional stakeholders, and Syrian government representatives on Syria's reconstruction and regional integration.

These engagements strengthened partnerships, amplified Syrian perspectives in high-level policy discussions, and contributed to dialogue on investment, economic reform, public-private partnerships, international cooperation, and long-term development priorities supporting Syria's broader recovery efforts.

New York July

In partnership with the Permanent Mission of the Syrian Arab Republic to the United Nations, the Syrian Forum organized a high-level side event titled **“Empowering Women in Syria’s Future: Civil Society and Good Governance,”** during the High-Level Political Forum in July.

The event highlighted women’s participation in governance and community-led approaches to Syria’s recovery.

New York September

United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) Advocacy Mission

During the 80th Session of the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA), the Syrian Forum conducted a high-level advocacy mission in New York to strengthen dialogue on peacebuilding, transitional justice, accountability, and inclusive governance in Syria while expanding engagement with international policymakers and diplomatic stakeholders.

Representation of Syrian Civil Society at the United Nations Security Council

- Facilitated and sponsored the participation of Syrian civil society representative Majd Shurbaji, Executive Director of Basmaat, in a United Nations Security Council briefing on Syria.
- Helped elevate Syrian civil society perspectives at one of the highest international decision-making platforms.

High-Level Diplomatic Engagements

- Participated in a series of meetings with diplomatic missions and international stakeholders during UNGA week.
- Advanced discussions on support for Syrian civil society, transitional justice, accountability, democratic governance, and pathways toward long-term stability.

Livestreamed across Syrian Forum digital platforms, the series expanded public engagement and strengthened evidence-based dialogue on Syria's evolving landscape.
